



- Public policy champion












Transparency and Trust

- Rate setting can be mysterious
- Rates can include a lot of extras
 - Franchise fees
 - Mitigation and impact fees
 - AB 939 fees
 - Free services
- Customers need to understand the community benefits

Perception of Fairness

- Customers may think
 - Recycling pays for itself
 - Trash collection costs more than recycling or organics collection
- Customers would like to be rewarded for waste reduction efforts
 - Pay As You Throw for Recycling and Organics
 - Base rate plus extra fees for service



Building a constituency

- Climate Action Plan
- Zero Waste Plan
- Community workshops
- Community engagement
- Community buy-in and support for change





Public Policy Champion

- Mayor Villaraigosa tripled the LA's trash collection fee from \$11 per month to \$36.32 per month to pay for more police
- Mayor Newsom signed mandatory recycling & composting ordinance in San Francisco
- Mayor Reed championed the exclusive commercial collection franchise in San Jose which helped to close a budget gap
